Falco Horne 5 is an underground gold-rich polymetallic mining project located in Rouyn-Noranda.

KEY COMPONENTS

- An underground mine under the former Horne mine
- A mining complex on the site of the former Quemont mine
- A tailings facility at the former Norbec mine site
- A conduit network between the complex and the tailings facility

Key components will be developed on already impacted sites, which will be rehabilitated at the end of mining activities.



A FAVOURABLE CONTEXT

- Copper and zinc are critical and strategic minerals (CSMs) essential to the energy transition and to meet decarbonization objectives.
- Local workforce and suppliers are skilled and world-renowned.
- Existing infrastructure can be used to optimize resources, and already impacted sites can be used to minimize footprint and restore environmental liabilities.
- Transporting the copper concentrate to the nearby Horne smelter results in low GHG emissions.

Horne 5 will be the #1 copper producer in Quebec.






